cybersecurity.


Benefit: This activity encouraged students to think creatively about how to present complex cybersecurity topics in a simple, engaging manner.

Educational Trip for KG Students: Exploring the Unit "How Do We Organize Ourselves?"

In the eleventh week of the first semester, second kindergarten students took an exciting educational trip within the school as part of their study of the unit "How Do We Organize Ourselves?" This axis emphasizes the idea that roles play a vital part in organizing the school community. The trip helped the children investigate and learn about various roles that contribute to the smooth functioning of the school, including the principal, librarian, guard, teacher, and nurse. The students visited key staff members to better understand their responsibilities:

- Visit to the Vice President: Ms. Maha Al-Omair explained her role in carefully selecting staff to provide the best support for the school community. During the visit, a student asked her about the name tag she wears, to which Ms. Al-Omair explained, "This is my name, so others can recognize me and know my role in the school."
- Visit to the Principal of the Primary and Kindergarten Levels: Ms. Lamia Al-Dabal shared her role in ensuring the safety of students and creating a learning-friendly environment.
- **Library Visit:** The children learned about the librarian's job, the available resources, how to borrow books, and the rules for visiting the library.
- Visit to the School Nurse: The students explored the nurse's tools and understood her role in maintaining the health and safety of students.
- Visit to the School Guard: The students learned about the guard's role in protecting the school community, ensuring safety, and organizing the arrival and departure of students.

This trip helped strengthen the students' communication and social skills, as they practiced addressing people according to their roles to meet their needs. They also discussed the importance of rules in the school community and their responsibility to follow them, while practicing strategies for organizing their time within the school. The visit was a valuable learning experience, reinforcing the students' understanding of organization and responsibility in their daily school life.
