The students had the opportunity to engage with a myriad of cultures and in deep conversations about 'how we know what we know'. The theme of the conference was to create a 'thought quake' by taking time to reflect and understand that uncertainty is an epistemic humility. There were numerous activities that students participated in. Each group shared their cultural practices through a presentation to kick off the conference. Our students started with an amazing presentation that showcased Saudi Arabia and the amazing Arab hospitality. The girls shared some traditional sweets and Saudi hospitality that amazed the audience. Then it was time for serious engagement with knowledge questions like, "Do the human sciences and literature provide different types of knowledge?", "Do the Arts have the power to challenge established moral values?", "How can we know when we should trust and defer to the authority of experts?" and so on. Students took a deep dive into these discussion sessions, offering examples and evidence from the world around them.

The second day was extremely challenging as our students presented exhibitions on TOK questions and had to respond to interrogating questions from fellow TOK students and teachers. Some of the exhibitions were on questions such as "What role does imagination play in producing knowledge?" "How might the context in which knowledge is presented influence whether it is accepted or rejected?" and many others.

Overall, the conference was an outstanding opportunity for students to really explore the role of TOK in the world and develop an understanding of this challenging IBDP course.


